SCLMA President's Message Dr Roger Faint



I was a panelist at the Sunshine Coast Health Institute (SCHI) Symposium on the 8th September.

The topic was 'How to develop the Hospital - Primary Care Interface to prepare for the Future'.

It was a great success and will be repeated next year!

To my mind the future is now the present and the health system and patient care is being significantly challenged. This includes ambulance response times, bypassing local emergency departments and ramping. Despite this, I am still convinced that Australia, including Queensland and the Sunshine Coast, has a very capable medical system which provides good care overall.

Patients often speak glowingly with regards to acute emergency care within the Sunshine Coast Health District. There are however significant deficits in communication and respect with regards to geriatric patients and I can't help feeling that 'ageism' is an ongoing problem.

The ongoing issue of prolonged outpatient ('ambulatory care') waiting and surgical list times for young patients needing joint surgery and replacements for their chronic pain is ever more pronounced.

I don't see an answer except for the obvious injection of increased dollars to mostly employ more health professionals, which is a perennial issue and difficult in the current COVID climate.

The phrase 'communication, communication, communication' comes to mind and I know Dr Peter Gillies (CE), and Dr Marlene Pearce (EDMS) will have discussed this and planned early solutions.

There is one obvious problem, which is the lack of Sunshine Coast General Practitioners with their Practices increasingly closed to new patient appointments and associated rapidly declining bulk billing rates.

Of course, this means patients will increasingly attend local Emergency Departments.

To my mind, one early obvious problem is the challenging financial issue for a GP registrar. To clarify: to leave the Queensland Health system as a junior doctor to undertake GP training is to take a significant pay cut and often the young doctor has a loan or young family.

Apologies regarding the pontification and now to the fun part of my article.

Paul is a proud Wiradjuri man whose artwork has been displayed in collections around the world, and we are fortunate that he has chosen to call the Sunshine Coast home.

Last year the Emergency Department received a grant to improve the cultural safety of the department for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people through the PROV-ED Culturally Welcoming Emergency Departments program. Part of this grant was used to commission the artwork provided by Uncle Paul.

The works display a beautiful triptych that illustrates the mountains, beaches and ocean of the Sunshine Coast. Dying to Know Day (8 August 2022) and SCHHS Memorial Event (18 November 2022)



Dying to Know Day (8 August 2022) is an annual day of action dedicated to bringing to life conversations and community actions around death, dying and bereavement.

Sunshine Coast Hospital and Health Service (SCHHS) End of Life Care Program Manager Wendy Kinton said she sees potential for a culture to be created where death is talked about honestly and compassionately.

"Talking about death and dying gives us an opportunity to creatively explore how we feel towards the unpredictability, yet inevitability of our journey," Ms Kinton said.

On the day Wendy encouraged the community to talk with their families about Advance Care Planning.

SCHHS is hosting a Memorial Service to remember loved ones who have died in the health service throughout the year.

Friday, 18 November at Birtinya, or online – 10am-11am.

"The service will provide a safe place for people to remember their loved one and to take some time to grieve," Ms Kinton said.

"Grief is a very individual experience that nobody else may be able to fully appreciate. Attending rituals like a memorial service may help us to move forward. We hope this service will be encouraging for people and bring hope for the future.

"It will also help staff to remember patients and their families who they have cared for in the course of their work, or even mourn their own family members.

Medical Profile - Dr Marco Giuseppin, Clinical Director Community and Preventive Health

He may have started his healthcare career as a pharmacist, but for Dr Marco Giuseppin, medicine is exactly what the doctor ordered.

Dr Giuseppin, Sunshine Coast Hospital and Health Service's Clinical Director Community and Preventative Health, says seeing the impact of chronic disease within his extended family and the diagnostic challenge of medicine ultimately led him to become a doctor.

He says it was an easy decision for him to work in general practice and rural medicine because he wanted to gain broad experience in managing chronic disease, and as a rural generalist, he also has experience working in anaesthetics and the emergency department.

"It's been a really incredible journey for me, and I've learned a lot. I've had the opportunity to learn from some incredible people and developed some incredible skill sets," Dr Giuseppin said.

While the increasing population in the Sunshine Coast region brought with it many challenges, Dr Giuseppin said there were also opportunities to change the way we care for our community.

"Sunshine Coast Hospital and Health Services is also undergoing a transformation as it as it becomes a tertiary level facility, but there are also pockets of rural healthcare in our region as well in places like Gympie and Maleny which also have an important role in delivering the service," he said.

"I think it's important we bring some of that rural mindset into our thinking about how we develop our services and really use that ability to make a difference in delivering care to our community."

Dr Giuseppin said there was now a shift in the medical workforce which was becoming more generalist.

"Twenty years ago, we were all very sub-specialised and everyone was moving into their little niche within medical practice," he said.

"We obviously need very good sub-specialist practitioners, but we've seen some incredible developments in terms of what we call the generalist medical workforce.

"This means we have an increasing number of doctors that have a really broad set of skills to look after the entire person. They can then use their sub-specialist colleagues to manage the really difficult problems that they may struggle to manage."

While COVID-19 has brought with it many challenges, it has also seen innovation in healthcare, according to Dr Marco Giuseppin.

"One of the great things that has emerged through the COVID-19 pandemic is increasing the role of virtual healthcare," he said.

"Our service is currently managing a COVID-19 virtual ward, and while we're currently experiencing an uptick in cases, we've been able to provide excellent care for our patients and I'm extremely proud to be part of this team.

"I think when people think about virtual healthcare, they think about phone calls and video calls, but it's really so much more than that and as a society and as a medical community, we're really only scratching the surface in terms of what virtual healthcare can offer.

"There's many other things we can use - artificial intelligence, machine learning, and synchronous and asynchronous virtual care modalities to really help improve access and outcomes for our patients.

"The future of virtual healthcare is really exciting and I'm looking forward to being part of that," Dr Giuseppin said.



Early Pregnancy Bleeding

An urgent review and ultrasound in ED is not indicated for most women with early pregnancy bleeding. Pain and bleeding in early pregnancy is common. Up to 60% of women experience vaginal bleeding in the first trimester of pregnancy usually this will settle spontaneously as the pregnancy progresses. Women who have had an ultrasound showing a viable intrauterine pregnancy with a fetal heartbeat performed after 7 weeks have a **low** rate of miscarriage.

Women with minimal bleeding/pain who are haemodynamically stable with a known intra uterine pregnancy presenting to the Emergency Department will be advised to see their GP for follow up. An ultrasound scan in the Emergency Department is not indicated if women have had a previous ultrasound scan which confirmed an intrauterine pregnancy.

Bleeding in early pregnancy that is suitable for review in ED includes:

- Bleeding with pregnancy of unknown location
- Bleeding with suspected or confirmed ectopic pregnancy on scan
- · Heavy bleeding that is ongoing
- · Haemodynamic instability

Please consider discussing this when patients present during their antenatal visit as part of expectation setting.

SCHHS Early Pregnancy Assessment Service (EPAS)

EPAS is an alternative service to assist GPs and women in management of miscarriage or ectopic pregnancy. EPAS is the SCHHS rapid access outpatient pregnancy assessment clinic for women with early pregnancy loss (< 20 weeks gestation), including stable ectopic pregnancies.

Referral criteria:

- Clinically stable
- < 20 week pregnancy size on ultrasound or by dates
- · Experiencing mild symptoms
- Diagnosed miscarriage (incomplete or missed) on ultrasound wishing for medical or surgical management, or after a trial of conservative management
- Pregnancy of unknown location or molar pregnancy requiring follow-up
- · Confirmed or suspected ectopic pregnancy
- Threatened miscarriage (open cervix)









Please be aware that EPAS is not intended to manage small amounts of bleeding in early pregnancy in the setting of a confirmed live intrauterine pregnancy and a closed cervix.

Please notify women who have experienced miscarriage and are wanting surgical management of miscarriage that SCHHS is moving away from inpatient surgical management and towards Manual Vacuum Aspiration (MVAC) allowing for outpatient management.

New Discharge Summary Format: Sign up today!

Discharge summaries sent from Queensland Health (QH) hospitals are now available in Clinical Document Architecture (CDA), which is an easier to read version sent electronically to your GP practice management software and *includes Pathology and Radiology results* in completeness.

Is my practice software compatible for CDA?

Queensland Health is successfully sending discharge summaries in CDA format to practices that are using the following systems: Best Practice LAVA edition or higher (includes Indigo), Medical Director v 3.16b or higher, ZedMed all versions, Genie V8.8.6 or higher, MMEx V22.1.3.1.

How can we sign up for CDA delivery?

All clinics and practices will need to be registered within the Queensland Health electronic distribution directory to be able to receive summaries in CDA format. To do so, please complete the following steps:


- 1. Update practice details via the Secure Transfer Service (STS) Address Book Update Form http://bit.ly/stsmoform.
- 2. Sign up for CDA testing by emailing EDSTV-Corro@health.qld.gov.au with your practice software details.
- 3. Work with the testing team to complete the required steps.
- 4. Provide evidence of a positive test result by emailing a screenshot to the testing team.

Once a positive test result has been confirmed in writing, your practice will be enabled to receive CDA discharge summaries directly into your practice management system.

The Acute Knee Clinic

The first few days can make all the difference in recovery from a sporting injury.

Dr Steve Lawrie at the Sunshine Coast Orthopaedic Clinic provides an Acute Knee Clinic each Monday and Tuesday which is specifically designed for, but not limited to, sports injuries of the knee with a view to rapid assessment, investigation and adoption of a management plan within the first few days of the initial injury.

The Acute Knee Clinic has now been running for twelve years. We have treated many professional and semi-professional athletes as well as the "weekend warriors", including a special interest in paediatric sporting injuries. Dr Lawrie has a close association with many sporting teams on the Sunshine Coast, including the Sunshine Coast Falcons, Melbourne Storm and many other local clubs.

Specific conditions that can benefit from emergent assessment include suspected ligamentous injuries, including cruciate ligaments, medial ligaments, multiple ligament injuries, acute patellar dislocation, locked knees and especially paediatric cruciate and meniscal injuries whether that be by implementing early surgical techniques

or an appropriate non-operative treatment programme.

To access the Acute Knee Clinic, a patient needs to have a current referral to Dr Steven Lawrie and plain x-rays of the knee should also be arranged before the initial consultation.

A plain x-ray is very important in the initial assessment to exclude fractures, loose bodies, and to show the alignment of the knee joint and the patellofemoral joint, which cannot be seen on other investigations, such as an MRI scan.

Splints and orthotics can be organized directly with Leonie Walton on 5473 5858. Leonie attends our clinic on a Thursday afternoon, but she is available throughout the week as needed.

The Acute Knee Clinic is intended to complement Dr Lawrie's other interests, including hip and knee replacement, revision arthroplasty, computer assisted joint replacement, cartilage surgery, as well as hip, knee and ankle arthroscopy.

Dr Lawrie is happy to take phone calls for advice, queries etc as this often helps the referral process.

Examples of these injuries include:

A medial ligament injury is usually easily treated in a range of motion brace, using an MCL protocol if applied with the 1st week or so. But it can be extremely difficult to correct if there is a delay of a number of weeks.

Paediatric meniscal tears may be repairable early after an injury, but a delay typically means meniscal resection becomes necessary.

Acute patellar dislocation may respond to surgical repair if surgery is offered in the first 2 weeks after the injury.

Traumatic meniscal tears where early repair rather than delayed resection can make a dramatic difference in outcomes

HOW MUCH SCREEN TIME? Dr Wayne Herdy



My colleagues will recall that I have an addiction practice (well, maybe a third of my work is with addictions, but that's enough). Way back in the past century, I kept seeing occasional cases of kids with what is now recognized as gaming addiction (yes, it's in DSM-V). These kids would sit in front of their X-box (the fashionable driver of electronic gaming in their day), sometimes all day, not eating, not drinking, not going to the toilet. And their parents were powerless to stop their behaviour, attempts at discipline being met with tantrums and rages comparable to the antisocial violence of chemical drug addicts.


Addictions take many forms, not just chemical addictions. Shopping addiction, gambling addiction, even sex addiction. But gaming addiction has increased to a point where it rivals chemical addictions as a social evil. The version of this illness that causes me most personal distress is evident when I see Mums come into my consulting room, and hand the toddler a mobile phone to occupy the child's attention. The child manages the device extraordinarily well, for an age group that does not yet understand letters or numbers. The child also controls the mother extraordinarily well, putting on a monumental tantrum if the device is removed, and the child has clearly taught that mother that only a dose of device time will allow her to manage a few minutes of her own life.

A few years ago, the World Health Organization started publicizing recommendations about safe or desirable levels of screen time. At first, the recommended time for under-2s was NIL. I regret that I do not think that I have any under-2s in my practice who enjoy NIL screen time.

Before COVID, a survey of American teenagers recorded that the average out-of-school screen time was a whopping 7.5 hours. How on earth can a teenager cram that much time into the gaps between school, meals, bathing, and sleep? Let alone having any time for what used to be recognized as developing normal social interaction. While the surveyors expressed incredulity at their findings, when they

repeated the survey after two years of COVID, the figure had increased to an astronomical 8.9 hours per day. When do these kids find time to breathe?

I attended a conference recently which included a dissertation on the sequelae of screen time and screen violence. Part of the findings included MRI evidence





Their frontal lobes – the chunks of the brain required to predict the outcomes of your behaviour, the source of normal social functioning – had become inactive and even physically reduced in size as well as activity. Teenagers are shrinking their frontal lobes by excess screen time. And that physical hardwiring change is presumably irreversible. When shown videos of violence, including quite horrific killings, the chronic gamers addicted to screen violence showed MRI changes equally disturbing. Their amygdala, the seat of emotions, actually shut down during the videos of extreme violence, including images of live humans being dismembered. I fear to speculate on what these gamers will end up doing in real life.

The message is clear. Parents need to become aware that mobile devices given to young children are not an innocent electronic babysitter, as we used to say in the early days of television. They inhibit the learning of the social behaviour, the concern for other fellow human beings, that are at the root of collective social functioning that has allowed homo sapiens to evolve above all the other creatures of the world. (OK, I know that not everybody agrees with Richard Dawkins in "The Selfish Gene".) And there is now MRI evidence that they irreversibly alter the hardwiring of the immature brain. There are many hypotheses about why humans came to dominate the animal kingdom.

If it is true that our sense of altruism and concern for our fellow man is the main reason for our success, then our electronic playthings are now threatening to drive us into extinction.

FBT EXEMPTION FOR ELECTRIC CARS INTRODUCED TO PARLIAMENT

The Bill amends the FBTAA 1986 to exempt from fringe benefits tax cars that are zero or low emissions vehicles held by the provider and used by or made available for private use of employees. Additionally, to be eligible for the exemption the value of the car at the first retail sale must be below the luxury car tax threshold for fuel efficient cars. This is to encourage a greater take up of electric cars by Australian road users to reduce Australia's carbon emissions from the transport sector, by making electric cars more affordable. The operation of the amendment will be reviewed after three years in light of electric car take up.

When the Bill becomes law, the FBT exemption will apply retrospectively from 1 July 2022 to eligible electric cars that are first held and used on or after 1 July 2022. An electric car ordered prior to 1 July 2022, but not delivered until after 1 July 2022, will still be eligible for the exemption. This will apply even if an employer acquired the legal title to the car before 1 July 2022. Second-hand electric cars may also qualify for the FBT exemption, provided the car was first purchased new on or after 1 July 2022.

New FBT exemption for Electric Cars

The FBT exemption relates to car fringe benefits and therefore will only apply to vehicles that are 'cars' for FBT purposes; other types of electric vehicles are excluded. Additionally, to be eligible for the exemption the value of the car at the first retail sale must be below the luxury car tax threshold for fuel efficient cars.

Generally, a car fringe benefit arises where a car is applied to or made available for private use to an employee, or an associate of an employee, by their employer.

Car benefit is exempt

Under the proposed amendments, a car benefit will be exempt if all the following conditions are satisfied:

- The benefit is provided to a current employee
- The car is a 'zero or low emissions vehicle'
- The value of the car at the first retail sale (i.e. purchase price) was below \$84,916 for 2022-23, which is the luxury car tax threshold for fuel efficient cars
- The car was first held and used on or after 1 July 2022.

The benefit exempted from FBT is the private use of the vehicle, including any associated costs of running and maintaining the car for the period the car fringe benefit was provided.

Eligible Electric Cars

This amendment will apply to cars that are:

- Battery electric vehicles
- Hydrogen fuel cell electric vehicles; and



NUCLEAR MEDICINE BONE SCANS

When are they most useful?

STAGING OF CANCER

Bone scanning, combined with SPECT CT is very sensitive for detection of osseous metastases from most cancers, in particular breast, prostate and lung. This modality is sensitive, as it detects osteoblastic activity, and can show lesions prior to radiological change.

ASSESSING ACTIVITY OF PAGET'S DISEASE AND TREATMENT RESPONSE

The degree of uptake on bone scintigraphy can help determine activity and extent of conditions such as Paget's disease. Serial imaging following therapy for Paget's or cancer is very helpful to assess treatment response.

EVALUATING ABNORMAL BONE LESIONS

Incidental sclerotic and lucent lesions are commonly reported on other modalities. A bone scan is very helpful to assess metabolic activity of lesions and determine their significance.

LOCALISING SITES OF BONE PAIN

Imaging with X-rays, CT or MRI will often identity multiple sites of degeneration or other pathology that may be causing pain such as facet joint arthritis, discovertebral disease or sacroiliitis. Studies have shown a higher success in pain relief when the sites showing the most marked activity are injected with cortisone and local anaesthetic. Bone scintigraphy with SPECT CT may also show other possible osseous causes of pain.

EVALUATING PAINFUL JOINT PROSTHESES

Joint prostheses cause a range of technical problems which make interpretation of radiographs, CT and MRI difficult. Bone scans are not affected by these technical factors, and are very useful for evaluation of loosening, periprosthetic fracture, particle disease and infection. A normal scan carries a high negative predictive value for exclusion of these conditions



The AAOS (American Academy of Orthopaedic Surgeons) have recently released new guidelines for management of knee osteoarthritis. This is now the third iteration of these evidence based guidelines. This year there is a complete re-write with recommendations being stratified according to the strength of evidence to support or not support the modality into strong, moderate or limited evidence. The following is a summary of these recommendations.

Strong Recommendations in favour of:

- ★★★ Supervised exercise, unsupervised exercise&/or aquatic exercise
- ★★★★ Self-managed programmes
- ★★★★ Patient education
- ★★★★ Oral NSAIDs
- ★★★★ Oral paracetamol
- ★★★★ Topical NSAIDs

Moderate Recommendations in favour of:

- ★★★☆ Canes/Walking stick
- ★★★☆ Unloader braces
- ★★★☆ Neuromuscular training
- ★★★☆ Weight loss (evidence downgraded)
- ★★★☆ Intra-articular steroids
- ★★★☆ Arthroscopic partial meniscectomy can be used for meniscal tears in patients with mild to moderate osteoarthritis who have failed physical therapy and other nonsurgical treatments

Limited Recommendations in favour of:

★★☆☆ Oral/dietary supplements may be helpful but evidence is inconsistent/limited and additional research is needed to clarify the efficacy of;

Tumeric

Ginger extract

Glucosamine

Chondroitin

Vitamin D

(evidence downgraded)

- ★★☆☆ Manual therapy in addition to an exercise programme (evidence downgraded)
- ★★☆☆ Massage may be used in addition to usual care (evidence downgraded)
- ★★☆☆ FDA-approved laser treatment may be useful (evidence downgraded)

- ★★☆☆ Acupuncture may improve pain and function (evidence downgraded)
- ★★☆☆ TENS may be used to improve pain and or function (evidence downgraded)
 - a. Percutaneous Electrical Nerve Stimulation for pain and function
 - b. pulsed electromagnetic field therapy may improve pain (evidence downgraded)
- ★★☆☆ Extracorporeal Shockwave therapy
- **★**★☆☆ PRP
- ★★☆☆ Denervation therapy
- ★★☆☆ High Tibial Osteotomy

Strong recommendations against use of:

- ★★★★ Lateral wedge insoles
- ★★★★ Oral narcotics including Tramadol

Moderate recommendations against use of:

- ★★★☆ Hyaluronic acid intra-articular injections
- ★★★☆ Arthroscopic lavage and or debridement

Consensus Statements; ★★★

Dry needling and free-floating interpositional devices should not be used

These recommendations can be used in determining management strategies in primary care management of knee osteoarthritis prior to considering knee replacement surgery.

Of particular interest is the new recommendation against any narcotic use, recommendations against hyaluronic injections, and recommends for arthroscopic partial meniscectomy if not responding to non-operative treatment in mild to moderate disease.

PRESIDENT AND CEO REPORT

The third Omicron wave has peaked but our health system is still recovering from months of unprecedented ambulance ramping, COVID hospitalisations and healthcare workers furloughed due to infection or as close contacts. Our GPs were also flat out, managing COVID cases in the community, delivering millions of COVID boosters and free flu vaccinations, while also dealing with non-COVID patients and other conditions, including patients suffering due to suspended or cancelled elective surgeries.

We are seeing increased strain in regional and rural areas, such as the closure of the Gladstone maternity unit forcing women to travel to Rockhampton to give birth. We are seeing more and more GPs unable to afford to continue to bulk bill. We have been very active in the media and behind the scenes on all these fronts.

The pressures may have been unprecedented, but they were by no means unpredictable. COVID simply highlighted what we have been warning about for years. We are continuing to advocate for solutions with governments and other stakeholders.

COVID CRISIS CONTINUES

The COVID wave peaked slightly earlier than the late August date forecast by Commonwealth modelling, but our medical workforce is overwhelmed and fatigued.

Emergency physicians are working on their days off, GPs are doing telehealth consultations from home because they have COVID, and healthcare workers are becoming increasingly stressed and distressed by the extent of suffering by patients and their families.

AMA Queensland's Ramping Roundtable chair Dr Kim Hansen shocked many when she told *Sunrise* that doctors are suffering moral injury from the impact of COVID – "We are seeing a lot more death and dying than we're used to and that does take a toll on us," she said.



Elective surgeries are being cancelled and outpatient appointments are being delayed. We need to know what the government plans to do to support our workforce and to resource GPs to continue to support the hospital system.

We continue to urge the Queensland Government to listen to medical advice. In the absence of mask mandates, we urge everyone to be sensible, take precautions and wear masks, because the strain in the hospital system affects us all.

We still do not know when the pilot, which was supposed to start in June, will commence, which towns and communities are taking part, which conditions it will cover, and if any pharmacists have undertaken the 120 hours of online training.

RESIDENT HOSPITAL HEALTH CHECK

The seventh annual survey of doctors in training has closed and the results are being collated to rate hospitals on how well they address issues affecting junior doctors.

It is critical to understand where hospitals are doing well and where there is room for improvement on issues including working conditions, overtime, training and culture. This survey drives our advocacy activities and ensures we support the growth of our medical workforce.

The survey is run by AMA Queensland and our Committee of Doctors in Training in collaboration with ASMOFQ the Doctors' Union. Results will be released in late September.

DIRTY ASHTRAY

It was AMA Queensland's unfortunate duty to accept the AMA/ACOSH Dirty Ashtray Award on behalf of the state government as the jurisdiction doing the least to protect children from the dangers of smoking. Queensland and Victoria were the joint 'winners' for a lack of regulation around e-cigarettes and vaping.

This is a particularly disappointing result as Queensland previously won the coveted National Tobacco Control Scoreboard Achievement Award for leading the nation in tobacco control measures for four years in a row.

Despite laws prohibiting the sale of illegal cigarettes to children, Queensland does not enforce the existing regulations, or require tobacco product retailers to be licensed. We have written to the Minister for Health and

the Attorney-General, calling them to urgently rectify these failures before Queensland children become the next generation of smokers and suffer the associated catastrophic health results.

AMA Queensland will take the Award to state parliament and display it at the Cancer Council Queensland showcase in September to draw MPs' attention to the need to take urgent action on vaping.
